**Second Sunday of Advent**

December 6, 2015

**First Reading: Baruch 5:1-9**

Baruch tells Jerusalem to rejoice because of God's plan to bring his exiled people back to Jerusalem. He emphasizes God's power and describes his plan to lower mountains and fill gorges to make their journey easier.

**Second Reading: Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11**

Paul encourages the Philippians to love each other completely. He hopes that their love and understanding will continue to grow so that they are prepared for the return of Christ.

**Gospel: Luke 3:1-6**

Luke describes the work John the Baptist carried out to help people prepare for the birth of Jesus. Luke also discusses who was in power at the time, which helped historians to figure out the exact dates of certain events, including Jesus' birth.

## Advent

This weekend marks the beginning of a new church year as we journey into Advent. Advent is a season of joyful waiting that leads to the celebration of the birth of Christ as well as anticipation for his second coming. This year Advent brings to light scripture passages from Luke's Gospel and the prophet Isaiah, which induces surprise into the season with a challenge to celebrate these weeks with self examination rather than as a countdown to Christmas. Luke's Gospel calls followers of Christ to give rise to the avoidance of living with drowsy hearts caused by the anxieties of life so that Christians pay attention to their actions, thoughts, and attitudes. This leads to the discovery of God in the details of each day as well as in the events and emotions of everyday living. This fulfills the main thrust of Advent.

Since Pope Francis has announced a Holy Year of Mercy that begins next week, Advent invites us to experience our own mercy so that we may extend it to others. In an article, *Mercy Me, Celebration* November 2015, Pat Martin states, "The pope believes that by making mercy our highest priority, the church will uncover the authentic experience of the Gospel that alone can help so many of us to know God for the first time and can help move many Catholic bishops from an emphasis on their juridical, doctrinal and hierarchical roles to their primary identity as apostles, shepherds and pastors... In his invitation, Pope Francis invites us to explore Jesus' relationship with his Father and with his disciples, who learn the ways of mercy by his example and through his parables. The pope urges us to consider anew these same parables, especially the Good Samaritan, the Unmerciful Servant, the Vineyard Workers, the Lost Sheep, the Lost Coin, and the Prodigal Son."

Advent also is a season to unlock God's presence in common activities that steer many to shopping, social gatherings, gift wrapping and card writing. It is common to lose sight that the Corporal Works of Mercy get lived out by a simple act such as holding a door open for a fellow shopper who is rushing into a mall. This becomes an opportunity for holiness. Affirming comments and patience with sales personnel at checkout registers also makes a day brighter for another who may be working long hours or new to a position. Tolerance on the road, as well as at airports, bus and train stations brings pleasantness into the life of a stranger who may never say thanks, but remember such an unexpected act of kindness. Hospitality coupled with listening skills at social events is another path to follow which provides someone an opportunity to share stories that engenders happiness on the part of an individual searching for conversation and attention. As a church community, Advent awakens us to needs that stem from social justice or world concerns; the recent terror attacks in France remind all of the way that life is so precious, and the need to cherish each day as a gift from God. Therefore, the hope throughout Advent is to discover peace within oneself through efforts that grasp God's presence in people which melts away distractions that lull followers away from God.

Tuesday of this week, December 1, is designated as World AIDS Day. This began in 1998 by the World Summit of Ministers of Health on Aids. The day generates hope where work is done to free the world from AIDS. The church is in a unique position to address issues that pertain to AIDS by offering counseling, love, and compassion to people with HIV/AIDS, their families, and friends. The theme for this year is "Getting to Zero, Let's End It." In 2014, an estimated 36.9 million people were living with HIV including 2.6 million children. A vast majority of these people live in low and middle income countries; also in that same year 1.2 million people died of AIDS related illnesses.

Today, the church welcomes you to the Season of Advent. Perhaps it is a post-Thanksgiving recovery from family gatherings, travel, food preparation and even a bit of shopping. Although the weeks ahead may initiate obligations to work schedules, medical needs, and a bit of fun, look for occasions to discover God in some of the forgotten or hurting people within each day. It will encourage you to know that your efforts throughout Advent are worth while.

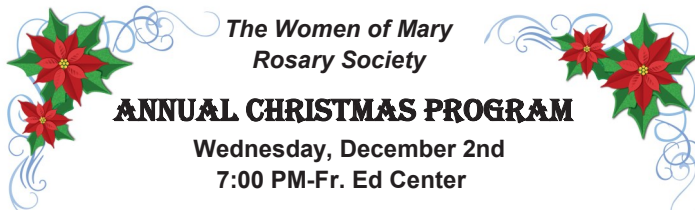
### **Christmas in a Box-Drop Off**
