First Reading: Acts 10:34a, 37-43



Paul asserts that we must pay attention to higher realms rather than earthly concerns. Our life is not yet completely known to us, until Christ appears and we are raised to glory in him.

Gospel: John 20:1-9

When Mary Magdalene discovered Jesus' tomb was open, she told Simon Peter and another disciple. They ran to the tomb and Peter went inside. He found the burial wrappings on the ground, with the head covering separate from the rest. The other disciple came in and they believed what they saw, although until then they had not understood the Scripture's message of Jesus' resurrection.

From the Desk of our Pastor

March Madness

Many of us highlight this month with “March Madness” as we check brackets from college basketball games to determine some good and bad choices made for the NCAA playoffs. Others see March as an opportunity to follow particular baseball teams at spring training with anticipation of opening day. March also takes us through an assortment of presidential primaries and caucuses as well as finalizing income tax returns to meet the April 15 deadline. The church invites us to a new type of “March Madness” called Holy Week, which springs forth the celebration of who we are through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The intent of Holy Week is to take a step away from normal activities, and focus on the high point of the liturgical year since it brings to light the crux of Christian beliefs that burst out through prayer, ritual and symbol. Today, palms are distributed upon entrance into church. Like the people who welcomed Jesus in Jerusalem shouting, “Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord,” we raise our palm branches to symbolize victory. This year the church uses Luke’s Passion Narrative to draw us into the beginning of Holy Week.

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week intone scripture readings at morning liturgy that pave the way to experience all that God has done for us in Jesus. On Monday evening at 7:00 p.m. in St. Philip Church, Clifton, Bishop Serratelli celebrates the Chrism Mass which includes the blessing of holy oils (oil of catechumens, used to anoint those preparing for Baptism (infants, children, and adults); oil of the sick (used to anoint those suffering from illness); and Sacred Chrism used for Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, and to bless and consecrate new altars). The oils get presented to our community at the Liturgy of the Lord’s Supper.

Thursday puts closure on the Season of Lent with the beginning of the Easter Triduum (three days, sundown on Holy Thursday through sundown on Easter Sunday) with the celebration of the Lord’s Supper. The Triduum renders a “single celebration of the Paschal Mystery presented over three days under different aspects.” The church marks the liturgy of the Lord’s Supper with foot washing and Jesus’ words, “As I have done, so you must do.” Foot washing is a powerful symbol of our identity as a servant people that calls for humility on the part of those who do it, and those who have done it to them. People experiencing foot washing are a representative group of the parish as foot washing is not a historical reenactment of 2,000 years ago. Pope Francis expressed this so clearly in the manner that he welcomed non-Catholics, women, prisoners, and children to share in the ritual; therefore, those having their feet washed do not historically represent the twelve apostles; but, the ritual calls forth a representative group of people from the parish of any number, background, sex or age. Foot washing becomes a recommitment to ministerial service by those who wash feet which is a powerful expression of faith.

Good Friday welcomes us with the opportunity to celebrate the Lord’s Passion at 3:00 p.m. Silence begins and closes this liturgy with John’s Passion Narrative read as the cross becomes the object of veneration. The cross is a symbol of victory and salvation, and is processed around the church as the words, “This is the wood of the cross” are chanted. The evening invites us to the living Stations of the Cross which are led by members in Youth Ministry. The living stations generate a visual of Jesus’ walk to Calvary as he is condemned, falls, seeks help, and dies. Like Thursday and Friday mornings, Saturday begins with Morning Prayer at 8:00 a.m. followed by the final preparation rites for those seeking full initiation into the church and the blessing of foods. At 8:00 p.m. all are invited to gather around the fire outside of church knowing that this is our Passover, God raised Jesus! At liturgy we renew the promises of Baptism and embrace the “light” that unites us as the people of God. Take time to plan participation in worship throughout Holy Week. It makes a statement that the Palm branches given out today are more than display, but symbolize marks of existence that identify your faith.

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

What do you call the sixth Sunday of Lent...the Sunday that begins Holy Week...the Sunday before Easter? Many refer to this Sunday as *Palm Sunday*, others call it *Passion Sunday*. In our liturgical year, this Sunday involves both palms and the Passion, as its name suggests. It is *Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord*. Some of us will remember when this was two distinct Sundays, *Passion Sunday* (when statues were covered), followed by *Palm Sunday*.

Recall that at the center of our faith is the Paschal Mystery—the Passion, Death, Resurrection and Ascension into Spirit-filled Glory of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The sixth Sunday of Lent—Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord—we commemorate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. At Mass this Sunday, we receive palm branches blessed with holy water. At the procession or the solemn entrance, we hear one of the Gospel accounts of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. During the Liturgy of the Word, we hear the Passion of Christ proclaimed. Each of the four Gospels includes an account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. You can read these accounts in Matthew 21:1-11; Mark 11:1-11; Luke 19:28-40; and John 12:12-10. It is interesting to note that it is only in John's Gospel that the word *palm* is used to identify the branches which the crowd used to welcome Jesus (John 12:13). Matthew and Mark do not specifically say what type of branches were used (see Matthew 21:8 and Mark 11:8). And in Luke's Gospel account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem (the one read this year), there is no mention of branches at all! But from early on in our liturgy we have used palm branches to commemorate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, where he would fulfill his mission for the salvation of the world! The blessed palms are a sacramental. Similar to a sacrament, a sacramental is also an outward sign—something tangible—that the church gives us to help open us to the grace of the sacraments. Because the palm is blessed, it is something holy and we treat it as such, being careful not to let it fall to the floor nor use it in an irreverent manner.
