Sunday of Divine Mercy

April 3, 2016

First Reading: Acts 5:12-16

The people held the apostles in great esteem and brought sick people to them to be healed. Although some were afraid to be known, the number of Jesus' followers continued to grow steadily.

Second Reading: Revelation 1:9-11a, 12-13, 17-19

John depicts a vision of lamp-stands of gold and one like the Son of Man in a robe with a sash of gold. The apparition told John he had nothing to fear and then described himself as one who was dead but now lived again. He then instructed John to record any other visions he might have.

Gospel: John 20:19-31

Jesus appeared to the disciples and breathed on them saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit." He gives them the power to forgive people's sins or hold them accountable. Thomas, who was not present, refused to believe Jesus had appeared until he came to them once more. Jesus told Thomas to believe and added, "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

From the Desk of our Pastor

My Wild Irish Rose

George was accustomed to driving his wife Rosie to church every Sunday. George and Rosie had been married for forty years and they loved each other deeply. They did everything together, and were inseparable in practically every area of life except one. When George drove his wife to church on Sunday, Rosie went in to pray, and George remained in the car reading the *New York Times*. After an unexpected illness Rosie died; and for a long time thereafter George's car was no longer seen in the church parking lot. After a few years on an Easter Sunday morning, George's car again appeared in the lot; and, to the surprise of Fr. Tom, George went into Church. Fr. Tom delivered a stirring Resurrection homily, and as was his custom he invited members of the assembly to respond. After a few seconds of silence, George stood up and with deep emotion said firmly, "Rosie lives!" Then he began to sing: "My wild Irish Rose/the sweetest flower that grows..." It didn't take long before the entire assembly joined George in song that permitted George to make known to all that the woman he loved was still present to him.

Today we gather to sing the most beautiful word ever sung in church, "Alleluia" which is a cry of jubilation spelling out the belief that Jesus lives and is present to us. Easter renders the glorious news that God raised Jesus from death to new life, which is the foundation of Christian faith. Easter begins in the darkness of night, in the hopelessness of ashes and leads us to the Risen Christ enabling us to mend broken lives through the compassion and peace that Jesus exhibited in his humanity. The celebration of Easter ignites the flame of Christ's victorious light in every corner of our lives that makes us stand up and shout "Alleluia". At Easter we celebrate God's presence in the Risen Christ, which makes the Resurrection of Jesus the most important event in history, and a mystery that touches all of us in that it challenges us to transform areas of human darkness into belief in the possibility of all we can become. The spiritual writer, Joan D. Chittister once used these words to describe the Resurrection of Jesus, "If Jesus is Risen, then you and I must go on following into all those godforsaken places where only one sent by Jesus ever goes. If Jesus is Risen, you and I can't stop at the baptismal font and say, "Enough. I've done it all. I've been faithful to the end. It's over now.' If Jesus is Risen, then you and I have no choice but to go in, put on the leftover garments ourselves, and follow Jesus back to Galilee where the poor cry out for food and cripples cry out to be taken to the pool and the blind wait for the spittle on their eyes to dry."

Easter is a fifty day season filled with promises of new life that get unveiled through signs, symbols, and prayers. One precious gift that gets extracted from Easter is a positive outlook on life. Although it took the early church a while before it realized the implications of the Resurrection, the Gospel writers render a positive outlook that helps us find meaning to life that steers us to discover beauty rather than ugliness, and faith rather than doubt in the dark corners of human existence. Belief in Resurrection shattered the darkness of those who were imbedded with an image of the crucified Christ in that at the site of the Empty Tomb people with restricted viewpoints saw the absence of God; whereas people of faith brought forth the daring proclamation that Jesus had Risen. This was an act of God that sprang forth testimony from believers who recognized the Risen Christ which became articulated through metaphorical language. It is only through the eyes of Resurrection that the life of Jesus makes sense as the four Gospels were written in the aftermath of Resurrection which colored each evangelist's image of Jesus. Resurrection gives us the desire to experience new life in our own abilities that take us from moments of chaos to the discovery of God's love.

In your celebration of Easter if you believe in one miracle, it must be the miracle of Easter. Enjoy this festive day and extend a Happy Easter to family and friends. Make those words spring hope in the incredible possibilities that exist in your life. As the early church gave witness to the works of Jesus, grasp courage to stand up for your beliefs aware that like George who belted out a song that proclaimed his love for Rosie, the Easter Season calls us to belt out a fifty day season of "Alleluias" which gives new vision to the incredible possibilities of all God can do in us. Happy Easter!

Have you ever thought of yourself as a priest? Perhaps unless we have celebrated Holy Orders and are an ordained priest, many of us would say no. Yet if we are baptized, we are indeed priests-we are members of the priesthood of the baptized, we are a priestly people.

At baptism, anointed with chrism, we received a share in the priestly, prophetic, and royal mission of Jesus Christ. Take some time to read and reflect upon 1 Peter 2:1-10. We are called to be a "holy priest-hood."

All other ministries in the Church, including the ministerial or ordained priesthood, flows out of this common vocation of the priesthood of the faithful, or the priesthood of the baptized. Think about how an ordained priest vests. The first vestment put on is an alb- a white garment- a baptismal garment, if you will.

There was a time in history, in the not too distant past, where we seemed to lose sight of this. Holiness was considered something most readily attained by ordained priests or consecrated religious. But this is so wrong. We are **all** called to holiness. We (**all** the baptized) share in Christ's priestly ministry.

Because we share in Christ's priestly ministry, we also share in the responsibilities for ministry and service which flow out of this (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #783 & 784).

Take great pride in being part of this priestly people, this holy priesthood God has called to be his own. Live out your vocation as a baptized priest each and every day. In baptism we died with Christ, so that we might live a new life in him and with him. We have been called out of darkness into light. We are a priestly people. This is indeed Good News. Alleluia!
