Sixth Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 15:1-2, 22-29

Some men informed the Gentiles that they must be circumcised if they wished to be saved, because of the Old Laws. From the Desk of Our Pastor

Mark, the Evangelist

Tomorrow, April 25, the church celebrates the Feast of St. Mark who is the patron saint of Egypt (tradition has it that Mark went to Egypt and founded the church of Alexandria), Venice (which claims that his body is in St. Mark's Cathedral, where it is reported to have been brought from Alexandria), and of notaries. One common symbol used to represent Mark is the lion. The feast of St. Mark holds much importance in the church calendar as most biblical scholarship consider Mark's gospel to be the first that was recorded as it dates back to 65 AD. It is also the shortest gospel even though eleven new verses not written by Mark were added to the original document. Contemporary scholarship holds belief that Mark's gospel is the primary source used by the authors of Matthew and Luke in that Matthew produces 550 verses from Mark, while Luke reproduces 420 of Mark's 670 verses.

In a book titled, *The Gospel of Mark*, William Barclay states, "The first three gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke, are known as the synoptic gospels. The word synoptic comes from the Greek words which mean to see together, and these three are called the synoptic gospels because they can be set down in parallel columns and their common matter looked together. It would be possible to argue that of them all, Mark is the most important. It would indeed be possible to go further and to argue that it is the most important book in the world because it is agreed by nearly everyone that it is the earliest of all gospels and therefore the first life of Jesus that has come down to us. Mark may not have been the first man to write the life of Jesus. Doubtless there are earlier simple attempts to set down the story of Jesus' life; but Mark's gospel is certainly the earliest life of Jesus that has survived."

Unlike the gospels of Matthew and Luke, there are no infancy narratives found in Mark's gospel, which gives credibility to the fact that he is the first gospel writer. Since the gospels were written well over 30 years after the life of Jesus, these writings became a way that preserved oral tradition that circulated about Jesus. Infancy narratives were later additions that permitted the gospels of Matthew and Luke to respond to concerns about the early years of Jesus. Mark's gospel renders a basic skeleton for the development of Jesus' life, which begins with an introduction of John the Baptist, who is an important figure in Mark's gospel. Jesus is baptized by John and experiences an apocalyptic vision which keeps the identity of Jesus a secret, which is known as the messianic secret. Throughout his gospel, Mark portrays Jesus as a servant who defines the character of a messiah with focus on Jesus' ministry in Galilee. Although Mark places Jesus in the desert to be tempted prior to his public ministry, his temptation scene is extremely brief (two verses) unlike the lengthy temptations illustrated in Matthew and Luke. One common feature Mark makes clear is that discipleship entails renunciation which directs us to the fact that Jesus was involved in stages of controversy in order to get his point across. Mark uses this as a method to knit together people in early Christian communities.

Details about the life of Mark are sketchy other than the belief that he was a companion of Peter, and he wrote his gospel from that relationship. Mark also holds a relationship with Paul as he accompanied him on his initial missionary journey. As an evangelist, Mark writes for Gentiles which are non-Jewish Christians. Debate still exists over the location used by Mark to write his gospel in that some scholars believe Mark wrote out of Rome while others claim Syria. Mark frequently speaks of the conversion of the Gentiles as well as his miracle stories contain Gentiles who are unfamiliar with Jewish customs. Miracle stories are commonly used by Mark and broken down into four unique types which include healing, exorcism, resuscitation, and nature miracles. Miracles in Mark demonstrate the manner that evil is overcome through God's works. As the church gives attention to the Feast of St. Mark on Monday, the day draws our attention to the man who was first to compose a document called a gospel that set forth an outline for others to follow.
