*From the Desk of Our Pastor*

### Catholic Charities (Part I of II)

Last month I met with a staff member from Catholic Charities who posed the following question to me, "Do you and the people of St. Patrick Church know all about Catholic Charities?" I hesitated a few seconds and articulated a list of activities that pertain to Catholic Charities aware that there are hidden undertakings of involvement that I did not know. I continued the discussion in making mention that most of the parish see Catholic Charities as an organization that reaches out to the needy with food, clothing, and shelter but there is a lack of knowledge that pertains to all that is involved in the mission of Catholic Charities. As we were chatting I noticed through the window in my office an individual get out of his car that was parked in the church lot emptying bags of clothing into bins sponsored by Catholic Charities. To the surprise of many, these bins are emptied no less than three times per week. Beyond accepting food and clothing, Catholic Charities also accepts vehicle donations that include cars, buses, trucks, vans, RVs, and boats. In the aftermath of our discussion I realized that most of us are unaware of all the efforts of Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Paterson which reaches out to thousands of needy people.

Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Paterson is a Catholic Social Services Organization that provides help to many poverty-stricken people throughout Morris, Passaic, and Sussex Counties in New Jersey. Through its 40-plus locations, Catholic Charities helps tens of thousands of people with ongoing services to help individuals raise themselves out of poverty, as well as provide immediate relief through food and shelter in times of crisis. The organization renders food for the hungry, counseling for the addicted; and, health services and housing for the developmentally disabled, AIDS sufferers and others. The organization comes to the aid of new immigrants settling in this country, and provides assistance to all who seek it, regardless of religion. Catholic Charities is one of the largest providers of social services in the region, and often the only place where the most troubled members of society can turn for help.

Most of the funding for the organization's activities comes from federal, state and government sources. Nonetheless, Catholic Charities is critically dependent on contributions of money from individuals and the parishes in the diocese as well as in-kind contributions such as food and clothing to continue to expand its services. Catholic Charities also depends on a network of volunteers throughout the region to maximize its reach to the needy. Catholic Charities in the Paterson Diocese is one of the five Catholic Charities organizations in New Jersey and, as part of Catholic Charities USA, one of the more than 160 throughout the United States.

Some of the struggles that face people within the counties of New Jersey that make up the Diocese of Paterson include the fact that more than half the children in Passaic and Paterson live in poverty. One in five in Sussex County and one in six in Morris County live in poverty. In New Jersey, 21 percent of those who need food assistance do not receive it whereas the average family of four receiving food stamps cannot pay for all of the meals the family needs each month. Also, is the fact that over 900,000 children in New Jersey experience hunger in any given year; and, drug addiction once confined to the poorest neighborhoods, is spreading throughout New Jersey suburbs. It is becoming a national crisis, affecting rich, poor, and middle class alike.

I would like to extend my thanks to all who were so generous in providing boxes of cereal and plastic bottles of shampoo in last week's annual Corpus Christi Food Drive sponsored by Catholic Charities. For the past three weeks many people brought the requested items to either the parish office or church for a total of 385 cereal boxes and 221 bottles of shampoo donated. Next week I plan to provide some details about facts that pertain to Catholic Charities that are unknown to most. Like myself, many envision Catholic Charities as an organization that assists the needy, but are unaware of the specifics within this organization that spreads the message of Christ.

### Reflection: Praying with Friends

Catholics pray with friends every time they attend Mass. But sometimes that's it. Unlike members of other Christian denominations, for whom praying in common is, well, common, Catholics often shrink from the idea of sitting beside a friend in silent prayer or—more daunting still—praying aloud with a friend.

But I love praying with friends. Even if it's as simple as saying grace before meals, it's fascinating to hear how others speak to God. It's a privileged window into how they relate to God, and so it can strengthen their own faith. A few years ago at a restaurant, I asked a friend if she would like to say grace. She smiled, and then listed all the things about our friendship that she was grateful for. And that made me grateful.


Perhaps the most natural time to pray with a friend is during difficult times. After a friend shares her problems—in her family, on the job, relating to health—why not ask if you can pray aloud with her? Then you can voice her concerns to God aloud. It helps when someone else verbalizes your worries: it's a reminder that if a friend can hear you, so can God.

It's odd that many Catholics aren't all that comfortable praying in this way—at least in my experience. Maybe we're more comfortable talking *about* God together than talking *to* God together. In that case, the next time you're with a friend, and you feel moved, why not bring God into the conversation? God's there already, but prayer is an excellent reminder of that.
