## Mission Co-op Weekend

Once a year each parish in the Diocese of Paterson welcomes a missionary representative assigned by the Mission Office to make a missionary appeal. The appeal is known as the Missionary Cooperation Plan. Bishop Serratelli and all who work at the Mission Office in the Paterson Diocese are grateful to all for the extra effort during the summer whereby appeals are made to help those who live in mission areas of the world. During the past year, the Diocese of Paterson contributed a total of more than \$262,000.00 to mission works to propagate faith in Jesus Christ.

Next weekend August 13/14, Fr. Isaac Honsan representing the Archdiocese of Imphal, India will speak at all masses about his diocese and missionary work as we are honored to have his presence. The mission Archdiocese of Imphal is situated in the extreme corner of Northwest India. It was erected in 1980 in a land area of 22,356 square kilometers, and covers the entire State of Manipur which is bounded by Nagaland in the North, Mizoram in the South, Upper Myanmar in the East and the Cachar district of Assam in the West. The Archdiocese of Imphal is home to 35 tribes of Mongolian origin who live in small villages perched on mountain tops and practice one of the most rudimentary methods of farming called shifting (Jhum) cultivation. Most of these villages are not connected with all season roads and sadly lacking other basic necessities like electricity, telephones, schools, and hospitals.

In 1912 Fr. Ansgar Koenigsbaver, SDS, a German Salvatorian missionary was the first priest to come to Manipur. He discovered 19 Catholics, 17 of whom belonged to the band of the regiment which was stationed there. The Maharajah of Manipur told Fr. Ansgar that he had no objection to opening a Catholic Mission in Imphal, the capital of the princely State; however due to limited resources and personnel the opportunity to evangelize Manipur could not be realized. In 1948, 36 years later, two Salesian priests visited Imphal and were welcomed to initiate a mission in the hills of Manipur. This led to the first Catholic baptism in the diocese recorded in 1952. The Catholic population has grown up to 100,000 as the diocese maintains 48 parishes, and 160 priests including 67 indigenous tribal priests. The growth of the Church has always been accompanied by various challenges and persecutions during the past decades in that between 1990 and 2001, six young and dynamic missionaries were killed for witnessing to the Gospel.

In spite of these challenges, missionary efforts are yielding an increase in vocations to priesthood and religious life. The proceeds of the 2016 Mission appeal will be used to build 30 low cost houses for widows and the elderly in 30 different parishes of the Archdiocese as part of the Year of Mercy. The Vatican Council maintains a special section on the Church's Missionary Activity whereby it states, "These churches which are often situated in poorer parts of the world still suffer from a serious shortage of priests and a lack of material resources. Therefore, they are extremely dependent on the continued missionary activity of the whole church to supply that assistance which is necessary for the growth of the church and the full development of Christian life. This missionary activity should also help those churches which although long established, are in a state of decline or weakness... Since the voluntary offerings of the faithful for the missions are by no means adequate, it is recommended that as soon as possible a certain sum be fixed to be paid each year out of their own resources by the diocese itself and by the parishes and the other diocesan communities."

On behalf of Fr. Isaac Honsan, I ask you to support his work and that of the Archdiocese of Imphal, India. With your help and participation in this mission appeal, you become part of his mission. Next week we all have the opportunity to give from the heart as well as include missionary activity in our prayers knowing that through our help we can better someone's life, and provide an opportunity for more people to share in the blessings of God's creation.

## PARISH NURSE MINISTRY

**Hot Weather Tips:** Some reminders of how to stay cool and avoid heatstroke during this hot weather we are experiencing:

- Drink fluids: drink plenty of cool, non-alcoholic beverages (water is best), especially when you're outdoors to keep the body's cooling system operating efficiently; avoid alcohol, which can induce dehydration
- Pace yourself: for work or recreation in the sun, be sure to take frequent breaks to take in fluids and cool off in the shade or inside. Put off strenuous activities or perform them in the morning or early evening when the sun's heat is less intense
- Use sunscreen. Reapply as needed after sweating, swimming or as recommended on packaging. The FDA recommends using products labeled "Broad Spectrum", SPF 30 or higher.
- Stay cool: use air-conditioning, if it's available; if it's not available, take cool baths, showers, or sponge baths and temporarily inhabit dry basement spaces, which can be 10-15 degrees cooler.
- Eat lighter meals: avoid use of your stove by eating more salads, fresh vegetables and fruit
- Dress appropriately: wear light-colored, lightweight cotton clothing, which readily releases perspiration and reflects heat. Cotton absorbs perspiration better and thus cools better than synthetics
- **Look after the very young and the aged: babies and older adults are more susceptible to heat induced illness such as heatstroke.**

Heatstroke symptoms are: a body temperature of 104° F (40C), confusion, agitation, alteration in sweating, hot and dry skin, nausea, vomiting, headache, flushed skin, rapid breathing and elevated heart rate. If you suspect someone is experiencing heat stroke, call 911 for medical help. Move the person into the shade, cool with fans, cool with a shower, bath, or garden hose, or apply cool compresses or ice packs placed under the armpits and neck.

### Why do Catholics sometimes genuflect and sometimes bow?

According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, "a genuflection, made by bending the right knee to the ground, signifies adoration, and therefore it is reserved for the Most Blessed Sacrament, as well as for the Holy Cross from the solemn adoration during the liturgical celebration on Good Friday until the beginning of the Easter Vigil" (274).

One is supposed to genuflect whenever one passes before the Blessed Sacrament reposed within a tabernacle (General Instruction of the Roman Missal 233). One is also supposed to give a bow of the body whenever one passes in front of the altar (Ceremonial of Bishops 72). The former discipline takes precedence over the latter. Thus, if the Blessed Sacrament is in a Tabernacle on or near the altar, one genuflects and does not bow. If there is no tabernacle on or near the altar, but rather reserved in its own chapel of special honor, or, if the tabernacle is empty, one bows to reverence the altar and does not genuflect. The Church's laws state that one is supposed to make the appropriate sign of reverence whenever one passes in front of the altar or tabernacle. The exception it makes is for people who are carrying articles in procession (e.g., a cross, a candle, book of the Gospels). These people are not supposed to genuflect or make a bow of the body (Ceremonial of Bishops 70).
