**First Reading: Exodus 32:7-11, 13-14**

God became very angry with the Israelites for worshipping a molten calf and making sacrifices to it. The people had so quickly violated his commandments that he planned to destroy them, but Moses pleaded with God for mercy and God relented.

**Second Reading: 1 Timothy 1:12-17**

Paul considered himself a former blasphemer and persecutor, and expressed his gratitude for the mercy Jesus showed him. Paul felt that he was a perfect example of Jesus' patience toward sinners and his desire to reconcile them with God.

**Gospel: Luke 15:1-32**

## Finding God in Your Work

Every six weeks I take a ride up to the Botany Village section of Clifton to visit my barber, Ozzie. He greets me with a hug and is always ready to listen and hear stories about my life as a priest. Ozzie (Oswald Chiarella) is an Italian immigrant who came to the U.S. at age 19 and worked sweeping up hair from a barber shop floor. Soon thereafter he was drafted into the U.S. Navy where he became a crew barber, which paved the way for jobs as a barber in Bayonne and Jersey City prior to purchasing his own shop in Edgewater. Ozzie has been cutting hair for almost 60 years and shows no sign of slowing up. Upon leaving Edgewater, Ozzie purchased a barber shop in Clifton where he has cut hair for the past 40 years. Most of his customers are regulars who appreciate Ozzie's work and dedication. Religiously, he opens up his shop at 7:00 a.m. (Tuesday through Saturday) and stays until 5:00 p.m., which is a long day. Ozzie loves to chat; conversations frequently stem around family, church, politics, and other priests who come for haircuts. He also never forgets to send me a birthday card. On the mirror of the barbershop are no less than twenty five postcards from trips that his customers have taken. Each time I come in he points out two postcards that I have sent him (Krakow and Shanghai); and, asks about the destination of my next trip. I have been visiting Ozzie's Barber Shop since 1994 and will keep up the relationship until Ozzie retires in that I admire the genuine love for work and people that comes from this man.

Tomorrow September 5 our nation unites for the celebration of Labor Day, which puts closure on many summer gatherings, recreation, and playful activities. As a child I never looked forward to Labor Day in that it signified the beginning of a school year; however, it is beneficial to take time to give thanks to God for the roots of labor and the importance to protect the right of workers. It also invites people to remember in prayer low wage workers who provide much good to society. These are people who work hard and seldom get recognized through awards, income, or verbal affirmation for their efforts. There are others who work under unpleasant conditions and face harassment, intimidation, replacement, and bad faith when they attempt to defend themselves.

Applause must be given to those who treat their workers fairly in building a strong workplace. A Pastoral Letter from the U.S. Bishops on Economic Justice states, "Changes in our hearts lead naturally to a desire to change how we act. With what care, human kindness and justice do I conduct myself at work? How will my economic decisions to buy, sell, invest, divest, hire, or fire serve human dignity and the common good? In what career can I best exercise my talents so as to fill the world with the Spirit of Christ?" Although the nature of the work world has changed due to longer hours, technology and lack of loyalty between employer and employee, ethical and moral responsibilities still exist; especially for those who oversee others in a work environment. Concerns over health care, affordable housing, transportation, education still touch upon many in a work environment. Stress ranks as a major problem in the workplace which leads to some unhappy faces; however, self-worth in work is not determined by the work that is done, but by how a person does his/her job.

Lack of work may knock the air out of some who are unemployed as it renders the false belief that a person is no longer needed. It takes determination to search for new opportunity when unemployed as it is easy for the unemployed to lose confidence in their abilities, yet an employment drought may be an opportune time to market unexplored skills in new and different ways even if it means a decrease in salary. Unfortunately, some generate a path that leads to anger, anxiety, alcohol, gambling, self-doubt, envy, fear, and procrastination when unemployed. President Harry S. Truman once stated, "It's recession when your neighbor loses his job, it is depression when you lose your own."

As the country celebrates Labor Day, take time to see the importance in the "work" God calls you to each day. On a bad day ponder your thoughts to the way your life would be without some specific chore, job, work, or volunteer activity. Coming to a job each day renders greater purpose to your life and the opportunity to spread God's love to co-workers, customers, clients, bosses, commuters, volunteers, or even competitors, which gives reason to celebrate Labor Day.

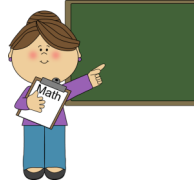
