Sunday of Divine Mercy

April 23, 2017

First Reading: Acts 2:42-47

In the early days of the Church in Jerusalem, the faithful listened intently to the teachings of the apostles. They lived a communal life, sharing all property in common and praying and taking their meals together.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:3-9

From the Desk of Our Pastor

Easter People

A police car pulled up in front of grandma Bessie's house, and grandpa got out. The polite police officer explained that the elderly gentleman said that he was lost in the park and could not find his way home. "Morris" said grandma, "You've been going to that park for over 30 years! How come you got lost today?" Leaning close to grandma, so that the police officer could not hear, grandpa whispered. "I wasn't lost, I was just too tired to walk home." Today we gather to celebrate the triumph of Jesus. Like Morris, it appeared that the message of Jesus was lost upon his crucifixion and death; however, God provided Jesus with a ride to new life. This promoted a joyful vision to his followers that changed the course of world history.

Did God really raise Jesus? If yes, how did it happen? There are multiple responses to this question that get recorded in the New Testament through people who proclaim "Jesus is Risen!" Although there was no eyewitness to Jesus coming out of the tomb, oral testimony from the disciples and Mary Magdalene paved the way for written testimony highlighted through the appearance narratives in the Gospels. Paul's Letters which preceded the Gospels render faith statements of his experience of the Risen Christ even though he did not know the historical Jesus. These faith statements redirected lives of those familiar to Jesus, and fostered belief that Jesus is the Messiah. Today, some 2,000 years later, many still ponder the question of Resurrection. An authentic test for belief is revealed through our lifestyles; yet one internal conflict for so many is the invitation to believe without seeing; this is called faith. Loyalty to that belief stems from the evidence of an Empty Tomb. Next Sunday, the scriptures will focus on the apostle, Thomas, who labored with belief in the Risen Christ. Throughout the fifty day Easter Season the church focuses on an assortment of biblical passages that demonstrate the strain of so many to recognize the Risen Christ.

The Easter Season begins in the darkness of night echoed through the Easter Vigil. People are baptized, a new Paschal Candle is lighted, baptismal vows are renewed, and the assembly is sprinkled with newly blessed water. This ignites the flame of Christ's victorious light in every corner of our lives, which makes us stand up and sing "Alleluia". As our Catechism states, "Easter is the feast of feasts, the focal point of the liturgical year. For this reason we call ourselves Easter People." The celebration of God's presence in the Risen Christ is a mystery that transforms areas of human darkness into belief in the possibility of all we can become. Since the light of the Risen Christ is highlighted through the Paschal "Passover" Candle which is blessed and lighted for the first time at the Easter Vigil, it gets positioned next to the ambo throughout the 50 day Easter Season as the flame glows at each mass until Pentecost. The candle speaks to us of Christ's power to dispel darkness discovered in the belief that Jesus "passed over" from death to new life.

Easter renders a positive outlook to life as the Gospel writers provide us with help to uncover meaning in our lives which steers us to bring to light beauty over ugliness, and faith rather than doubt in the dark corners of human existence. Belief in Resurrection shattered the darkness of those who were imbedded with an image of the crucified Christ in that at the site of the Empty Tomb people with restricted viewpoints saw the absence of God; whereas people of faith brought forth the daring proclamation that Jesus had Risen. It is only through the eyes of Resurrection that the life of Jesus makes sense as the four Gospels written in the aftermath of Resurrection colored each evangelist's image of Jesus. Resurrection gives us the desire to experience new life in our abilities that take us from moments of chaos to the awareness of God's love.

Enjoy this festive season! May those familiar words, "Happy Easter" spring hope in the incredible possibilities that exist in your life. Grasp courage to stand up for your beliefs aware that like Morris who needed a ride home from the park, the Easter Season invites you to a ride which gives new vision to the incredible possibilities of all God can do in you. Happy Easter!

A pilot program which will offer rides to senior residents of Chatham and Madison age 65 and older for a nominal fee, will be available April 1-June 30, 2017. On-demand transportation service will be provided by GoGoGrandparent who will transport you where you want to go, when you want to go, day or night. The cost is \$5.00 each way within a 15 mile radius. Seniors must register before using this program. Registration is simple, free, and can be done online or on the phone! Basket Bonanza yields new tech for St. Patrick School!

St. Patrick School held its annual Basket Bonanza fundraising event. Thank you to all of the families, parishioners and alumni who supported the event. During the evening, a special live auction was held to purchase new Promethean ActivPanels for the classrooms. The appeal raised over \$35,000. The new interactive touch panels will be available in classrooms in Fall 2017.

St. Patrick School Grade 7 students participated in the Living Voices of Morris County program sponsored by the Morris County Historical Society and the New Jersey Consortium for Gifted and Talented Program. The goal of the program celebrated "Living Voices," a comprehensive oral history project undertaken by students from across Morris County. Easter is the celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is the most important holiday in the Christian calendar. It is celebrated on Sunday and marks the end of Holy Week, the last day of the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday), and is the beginning of the Easter season of the liturgical year.

As we know from the Gospels, Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day following his crucifixion, which would be Sunday. His resurrection marks the triumph of good over evil, sin and death. It is the singular event which proves that those who trust in God and accept Christ will be raised from the dead.

The Easter date is movable and always falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25. The date of Easter is determined by the moon. Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday, after the first full moon, after the spring equinox.

In the Gospels, the precise details of the Easter narrative vary slightly, but none of these variances are critical to the main story, and many believe that the variances are simply matters of style and not substance. Despite the variances, the key aspects of the Easter story all match. Above all, they agree that the tomb of Christ was indeed empty, which is the most essential fact.

Sunrise services are common, but are more common with our Protestant brothers and sisters than in the Catholic faith. Sunrise services are gathered before dawn and reflect the arrival of the women at Jesus' tomb early in the morning. The services take place outdoors, often in the church yards, cemeteries, or in parks, and are timed so the sun will rise during the course of worship.

Following Easter Sunday, the season of Easter begins and lasts for seven weeks, ending with Pentecost.
